This newsletter begins with the registration of the first call of cruise ship "**Spitsbergen**" to Lisbon. Built in Portugal, in the shipyards of Viana do Castelo, the ship would have the purpose of carrying out inter-island connections in the Azores.

After being arrested for several years due to debts, the ship was acquired by Hurtigruten Expeditions, thus preventing the early dismantling of a ship with so many problems for such a short age of existence.

With regard to the containerization sector, the port of Lisbon began to register a notable growth in the number of calls and corresponding number of containers handled.

With official numbers around 10% growth, they are a victory for Lisbon, after so many wasted years.

Examples of this growth were the ships' inaugural calls:

"RDO Favour" chartered by ONE, for the Mediterraneo - East Coast service of the United States.

"CMA CGM Amber" inserted in the Northern Europe - West Coast of Africa service.

"Velika Express" introduced on Hapag Lloyd Service linking Turkey to the United States

"Ferdinanda S" of the Portuguese Group GS (Grupo Sousa), which makes one of the Maersk Line services to Africa, connecting to the Maersk Container Terminal in Algeciras.

"X-Press Kaveri" chartered by Melfi Marine, for the Mediterraneo – Cuba Canada's Service.

"Green Ocean" inserted on Evergreen's "Intra Europe Service" and her sister "Green Sea"
